## SOLUTIONS 5. 3.3.2014

Q1: Pricing. Mathematically, Q1 is the same as the US dollars/Swiss francs example in I. 8 [L5]. We proceed as there.

With $H$ the payoff of the call option $C$ in a year's time: $H$ is 50 if the gold price goes up, 0 if it goes down.

We determine the risk-neutral probability $p^{*}$ so as to make the option a fair game [martingale]:
$1,150=p^{*} \cdot 1,200+\left(1-p^{*}\right) \cdot 1,050=150 p^{*}+1,050: \quad 100=150 p^{*}: \quad p^{*}=2 / 3$.
The value of the option at time 0 is

$$
V_{0}=E^{*}[H]=p^{*} \cdot 50+\left(1-p^{*}\right) \cdot 0=50 \cdot p^{*}=50.2 / 3=33.33 .
$$

Q2: Hedging. We are given that the call $C$ is financially equivalent to a portfolio $\Pi$ consisting of a combination of cash and stock [gold]: this is because the binomial model is complete - all contingent claims (options etc.) can be replicated in this way. See IV. 3 [L16].

To find which combination $\left(\phi_{0}, \phi_{1}\right)$ of cash and gold, we need to solve two simultaneous linear equations, one for the 'up' state and one for the 'down' state:

$$
\begin{aligned}
50 & =\phi_{0}+1200 \phi_{1}, \\
0 & =\phi_{0}+1050 \phi_{1} .
\end{aligned}
$$

Subtract: $50=150 \phi_{1}: \phi_{1}=1 / 3$.
Substitute: $50=\phi_{0}+400: \phi_{0}=-350$.
So the option is equivalent to the portfolio $\Pi=(-350,1 / 3)$ : long, $1 / 3 \mathrm{oz}$. gold, short, 350 (\$).
Check: in a year's time,
Gold up: $\Pi$ is worth ( $1 / 3$ ). $1200-350=400-350=50$, as $H$ is;
Gold down: $\Pi$ is worth (1/3). $1050-350=350-350=0$, as $H$ is.
Q3: Arbitrage. By Q1 and Q2, you know $C$ and $\Pi$ are worth 33.33 now.
(i) If you see $C$ being traded (= bought and sold) for more than it is worth, sell it, for 40 . You can buy it, or equivalently the hedging portfolio $\Pi$, for
33.33. Pocket the risk-free profit 6.67 now. The hedge enables you to meet your obligations to the option holder, at zero cost.
(ii) If you see $C$ being traded for less than it is worth, buy it, for 20 . You can sell it, equivalently $\Pi$, for 33.33 . Pocket the risk-free profit 13.33 now. Again, the hedge enables you to meet your obligations to the option holder, at zero cost.

Of course, this is 'free money', so we should do it again, and keep doing it for as long as this arbitrage opportunity presents itself. No individual or institution can or will withstand being used as a 'money-pump' in this way by you, and the other market participants who will do likewise, indefinitely. So they will withdraw from the market, or be driven from it: arbitrage opportunities are transient. That is why assuming no arbitrage (NA), our standing assumption (IV. 2 L15), is reasonable to a first approximation.
